It's hard to imagine a Guitarist who could win the admiration of such a diverse group of Artists as T-Bone Walker, B.B. King, Jimi Hendrix, Stevie, and Jimmie Vaughan, Willie Nelson, Waylon Jennings, Etta James, Bobby Blue Bland, John Lee Hooker, and Buddy Guy, to name a few. MEL BROWN was that Guitarist!

In an interview with Derek Trucks of the Tedeschi Trucks Band when asked whom he is listening to these days he is quoted "I'm listening to everything I can find by a guy named "Mel Brown"

In late October at the site of the iconic blues club named Pop the Gator located at 44 Queen Street south (beside the Walper Hotel in Kitchener), a sizable crowd was in attendance witness the unveiling of Mel Brown's statue. From 1989 to 1995 Mel Brown played at Pop the Gator over a hundred times. The Museum of Kitchener raised the money during the presentation of the Unzipped exhibit of memorabilia and artifacts of The Rolling Stones and a

fundraising raising concert held after that presentation also held at TheMuseum.

The creation of the statue was completed by Brampton's Abiola Idowu who has stated it was a great and rare privilege to make a statue of Brown and have a part in the beloved musician's story. Idowu's sculpture has Brown sitting on a bench, wearing a hat, and playing a guitar.

Mel came to Kitchener in 1989 to lead the house band at the blues club Pop the Gator on Queen Street South. Glenn Smith hired Mel for the gig during a visit to Austin TX, where Mel was playing in the house band. for the legendary blues club Antone's. When Pop the Gator closed, Mel stayed in Kitchener until his passing in 2009. Mel released several CDs on Electro-Fi Records out of Toronto Ontario and mentor many young local musicians including Shawn

Kellerman (sideman Bobby Rush & Lucky Peterson Steve Strongman Juno Award Winner), and Julian Fauth Juno Award Winner,

Mel was a great inspiration for the creation of The Grand River Blues Society (2003) and The TD Kitchener Blues Festival which started in 2000. Mel Brown performed at every Kitchener Blues Festival until his death in 2009.

The TD Kitchener Blues Festival honors Mel by awarding a Mel Brown Award every year to a person who has contributed a great to blues and the success of the Kitchener Blues Festival. Past recipients include Bobby Bland, Jimmy Vaughn, Bruce Iglauer, and Holger Petersen. The legacy of Mel Brown in Kitchener is a great one. To this day, his direct influence on the Canadian music scene continues in the region and across the country.

TheMuseum and The Grand River
Blues Society are working together
to bring the project of the statue
and the Mel Brown Mississippi
Blues Trail Marker come to fruition
in the hopes that both could be
positioned side by side in
Kitchener. Mel Brown
unfortunately has no historical
Blues Marker in Mississippi which
is an oversight. The first
Blues Marker in Canada could be
in Kitchener honouring him. A
Blues Marker can fit up to 500



words and photos to tell his story and Mel's legacy to Canada.

Feature Performers To Be Announced

TORONTO BLUES SOCIETY ANNOUNCES WINNERS OF THE INAUGURAL INDIGENOUS ARTIST/GROUP OF THE YEAR AND THE BLUES BOOSTER OF THE YEAR AWARD

(Toronto, ON) – The Toronto Blues Society has announced the winners of two very special Maple Blues Awards, one being the inaugural Indigenous Artist/Group of the Year and the coveted Blues Booster of the Year award, to be presented at the upcoming 27th annual Maple Blues Awards on February 12, 2024 at Phoenix Concert Theatre.

The Toronto Blues Society has been encouraging the emergence of Indigenous blues talent throughout the years since 1993, when they produced the first all-Indigenous blues show, titled, 'Rez Bluez'. Since then, the talent in this genre by Indigenous musicians has grown substantially. During the pandemic the TBS Board proposed the idea of having a Maple Blues Award for an Indigenous Artist or Group. With the assistance of Elaine Bomberry as chair of the committee, six additional Indigenous people, including Diane Kohoko, Amos Key Jr., Mell Kirkland, Ted Whitecalf, Lance Delisle, and Dennis Joseph, who are knowledgeable in the blues genre participated as volunteers. Together they compiled an overall list and voted for the Indigenous Blues Artist/Group.

The recipient of the Indigenous Artist/Group of the Year is Nashville-based Crystal Shawanda, Anishinaabe from Wikwemikong Unceded Territory, Manitoulin Island. A JUNO Award winner and multiple Maple Blues Award winner, Shawanda is a force to reckoned with on stages across North America. "Having crossed over from the country music genre, she made her soulful blues voice known right away from coast-to-coast-to-coast", says Bomberry. "Not only does she perform at large festivals and concert halls, she also performs extensively at Indigenous events and speaks to and inspires Indigenous Youth throughout her travels."

On receiving word of the award, Shawanda exclaimed "I'm so thankful to everyone for this great honor, and excited and hopeful that this new category will serve as a steppingstone for all the amazing Indigenous artists on the blues music scene today. Thank you to the Toronto Blues society for creating this space. Miigwetch!"

Kamloops BC's Brant Zwicker, who is the winner of the Blues Booster of the Year award, is a long-time advocate for blues music through his syndicated radio program "At The Crossroads, where he acts as the host, writer and producer of since February 2003. "At The Crossroads" is heard on 112 FM transmitters or streaming platforms in Canada, the U.S., the U.K. and Belgium. The Blues Booster of the Year award is a very special recognition given to individuals and festivals for their dedication to supporting blues in Canada. "To receive an award of the stature of Blues Booster of the Year from the Toronto Blues Society truly is a significant honour for me. I do what I do in the blues community purely out of love and appreciation for the music and for those who make and support it", says Zwicker. "That has always been the goal and the reward, so to be recognized for something that comes naturally to me is, indeed, most humbling."

The Maple Blues Awards is Canada's national blues awards program. Its goal is to promote blues music across Canada, and to recognize outstanding achievement in the field. The not-to-be-missed awards gala and performances will take place on Monday, February 12th, at The Phoenix Concert Theatre (410 Sherbourne Street).

Just who is Willy A and what is The Old Chicago Blues Show?

Born in Toronto, I took an interest in music from a very early age. Having had parents who loved Big Band swing music and Jazz, was just the beginning of my musical journey. From the top 40 pop music of the mid 1950's, I soon discovered that my music of preference came from artists that sang with heart felt emotion. As such, RnB and Soul music of the 50's, 60's and 70's, soon became my passion. While in high school, I discovered my ability to emulate that same music vocally, and it lead me to becoming the lead singer for three different bands; **The Ambassadors, The Delphi Review and The Spirit.**

With the Blues being the granddaddy of most popular music, it was a natural progression to develop an appreciation for Blues music and its historical significance. A little over **twenty six years ago**, a chance meeting with a CKWR Board member, at a Fathead concert at the old Kitchener Station Hotel, lead to an apprenticing opportunity and eventually becoming the deejay host of the Old Chicago Blues Show in **January 1997**. This was such a natural fit for me, as I understood and appreciated that Blues music was the basis for so many present day music genres, including the RnB and Soul Music I grew up with.

In 2003, when I became a founding member of the **Grand River Blues Society**, it proved to be the perfect vehicle to help extend the outreach of Blues music into our community and beyond. Watching the Society continue to thrive 20 years later instills in me a great sense of satisfaction and pride. Over the years, I've proudly showcased not only Chicago Blues, but rather all styles of Blues music from artists worldwide. At the same time, I've managed to maintain a lifelong passion for the classic RnB music of the 50's, 60's, and 70's, by presenting weekly tracks from those decades, on my "RnB Corner", which draws from my treasured collection of records, vinyl and CD's.

Another exclusive weekly show feature is what I call a trip back in time, on the "Time Travel Train", where the train will magically take you back to a recording studio, where you sit in on a classic Blues recording session, by a legendary Blues artist. Artist background details are always provided before your journey. Plus the Old Chicago Blues Show also keeps you well informed of the goings on of all things Blues, in the Region and beyond.

So, now you have a snapshot of me personally and how the Old Chicago Blues Show has evolved under my watch. But there's so much more to getting a radio program to air. Let me explain.

How Programs Are Recorded and Submitted

In simple terms, shows are generated from the radio station by means of a computer program, specially designed for radio stations. Programmers have the option of recording shows direct to air in the station, or recording remotely and sending a show to the station engineer. He is responsible for ensuring live to air shows (including predetermined music, commercials and public service announcements) are input into the computer, utilizing time slots. Remotely submitted shows, e.g., **The Old Chicago Blues Show**, often use the programmers own hand-picked music, station IDs and ads. These shows are forwarded to the engineer via an MP3 and also slotted into the station system on the day and time the show goes to air.

In a nutshell, that's how the shows get to air. It sounds pretty simple but putting the show itself together requires a lot of time and preparation. I estimate that each show I prepare remotely, takes roughly 6 hours each week. It would be so easy to just randomly choose music and record the show. But my sense of commitment to Blues music, the artists and my audience, has me following a regimented routine each week as I explain on the next page.

Program Preparation by the Show Host

- Listen to new music that is continually being sent to me from usually three sources: Publicity and Public Relations Companies (thank you Sarah French, Eric Alper, and others), artists, and music labels. It's a constant flow of music, sent both digitally and occasionally via CD's, showcasing a variety of artists and various styles of Blues.
- Pick and choose numerous tracks that could be used not just once, but in future weeks as well. I hand pick recordings that would be the most interesting for a weekly three song "Feature. Variety being the spice of life.
- Ensure that the program's song selections will meet the CRTC guidelines of the minimum amount of Canadian content that is acceptable, based on specific Categories of music. For example, the majority of tracks played on my show fall under Category 2, which requires a minimum of 35% Canadian content.
- Try to pick an interesting variety of artists, styles and flow of music. To do so, I categorize the songs as slow, medium and fast; incorporating a nice mix of tempo to pique the listeners' interest.
- Do extensive artist research for special Features and for the "Time Travel Train" and "RnB Corner" segments of the program.
- Complete a Log Sheet of your selections, showing artist name, song title, category of music, indicating Canadian content, showing when you spoke/played Station ID's and Ads and the amount of talk time during the show.
- Record the actual show using special software; ensuring that my voice and song levels have uniformity of sound range, for enjoyable listening. This requires checking the levels after each song (because music is often recorded at different volumes). Ensure that songs flow nicely into each other, thus removing any dead air between songs. (Dead air is an absolute no-no on radio)
- Forward the completed show recording to the station and then keep track of which songs were played by each artist. This avoids duplication of songs being played and hopefully keeps the music selection fresh for the listeners.

So Blues lovers, in closing, I want to thank you for supporting the Old Chicago Blues show for the past 26 years (and counting) and I would be delighted if you could join me, every **Saturday afternoon from 12:30 – 2:00** PM, on 98 5 CKWR, and discover the incredible history and diversity of the music that's proudly known as "The Blues".

Christmas is fast approaching and each year I do <u>3 shows</u> dedicated to Blues and RnB Christmas music. The first will be aired on December 9 and I hope you will join me for all three. You just might hear my favourite Christmas tracks listed below:
