The GRAND RIVER BLUES AWARD is presented annually to an individual or individuals who have contributed to blues music or the growth of the blues in the region.

The first Award was presented in 2023 at the Grand River Blues Camp conclusion at the Kitchener Blues Festival. The Award recipients were Dennis Cuomo and George White founders of The Grand River Blues Camp.

At the AGM after party held at The Jazz



Room in Waterloo Grand River Blues Society President Bruce Hall proudly presented the 2024 Grand River Blues Award to WILLY A.

A little over twenty-seven years ago, a chance meeting with a CKWR Board member, at a Fathead concert at the old Kitchener Station Hotel, lead to an apprenticing opportunity and eventually becoming the deejay host of the Old Chicago Blues Show in January 1997. This was such a natural fit for him for he understood and appreciated that Blues music was the basis for so many present-day music genres, including the RnB and Soul Music he grew up with.

In 2003, when Willy became a founding member of the Grand River Blues Society, it proved to be the perfect vehicle to help extend the outreach of Blues music into our community and beyond.

Watching the Society continue to thrive now for 21 years instills in him a great sense of satisfaction and pride. Over the years, Willy A proudly showcased not only Chicago Blues, but rather all styles of Blues music from artists worldwide. At the same time, he has managed to maintain a lifelong passion for the classic RnB music of the 50's, 60's, and 70's, by presenting weekly tracks from those decades, on his "RnB Corner", which draws from his treasured collection of records.

# Boomers

Boomers first opened in February 1995.

In 2000 Teresa brought the blues music back to Kitchener by offering Friday night live bands and a jam night on Thursdays with Shawn Kellerman and Douglas Watson. Saturday nights was the Blues Devils who really enjoyed playing Boomers.

One of our best experiences for Teresa was the day Mo Kauffey walked into Boomers with and said to her "hey we play music do you want to hear us", of course Teresa agreed and the Boomers Brewhaha started Fridays with the after work crowd. Sometimes there were 11 people up there. And many young's guy got their start there like Jesse Webber and Dan Beacock.

Pete Temple played every week and that's how Teresa got to meet Liz Temple who became a founding Director of The Grand River Blues Society and a Director with the TD Kitchener Blues Festival.

Friday nights were busy and seldom was there ever a cover charge. Boomers booked Jack dekeyser, Downchild, David Rotundo, Mark Stafford, Fathead, David Gogo, Cheryl Lescom and the list goes on and on.

Teresa Manning received so much help from dearly departed Philip Bast, Jason from the KW Record, Claude Cloutier, Bruce Hall and a few others including my other boy Kevin Doyle of the TDKBF and much later the iconic Boathouse.

Then in early 2001, this great guy named Grant Rawcliffe came to me and said in New Zealand we do a Blues Brews & Barbecue and pitched the idea to pique some interest. Well then of course Teresa said yes. Apparently, Don Chapman from the City of Kitchener sent him. That was the beginning of the Kitchener Blues Festival. It was renamed after a few years so it was more easy for people to find us. The first year Blues Brews and BBQ was put it together in just a few months and had 3000 people attending. It was amazing all local bands like Daddy Long Legs, Mel Brown and waterstreet blues band.

Teresa called all the right people who she knew would be a great team, Rob Deyman, Marty Schreiter, Don Chapman, Grant Rawcliffe, James Anthony and Teresa herself.. Over the years she pulled in Kevin Doyle, Rob Barkshire, Liz Temple, Claude Cloutier, and many others.

From the Boomer's Blues Bar, the Grand River Blues Society idea of forming from a MSN Blog discussion moved to a in person meeting at Boomer's downstairs Bar which led to even more great things happening.


Teresa was on the Board OF Directors of TDKBF for 12 years until her husband and her moved up to Northern Ontario.

She still attends yearly as a volunteer overseeing the Festival's City Hall and King Street areas.

She has been given the title of honorary board member. She is quoted as saying "I'm not sure if it means anything but hard to get rid of the founding board member. I owe a lot to many people who helped but we owe a lot to Grant Rawcliffe who brought the idea to me so many years ago.

# Scott Wilkinson

I was always AWARE of the blues, and played it periodically, but I didn't really get the bug until I decided to see who my musical heroes were listening to and influenced by. I think the 3 artists that really launched me into being a 'bluesman' were The Allman Brothers, Rory Gallagher and Roy Buchanan. There were certainly other influences, but these guys, I could listen to all day.

One day, at a bar called, 'The Other Side of Five', I struck up a conversation with a guy named John Hoovenaars. I was aware of John, we saw each other at blues shows, etc., but never really talked at length. We sat at the bar and started talking about music, and primarily the blues. We had similar tastes and he seemed interested that I had a good knowledge base and "could put complete sentences together" He eventually asked me, "Would you like to co-host my radio show?" I thought it was a cool idea, but I had never been in front of a microphone in my life. (And that still may show.) I said that I would consider it and come up to the studio and see what it entailed.

For a couple of weeks, I shadowed John, in the studio. He showed my how the board and all the equipment worked. I began to feel comfortable with the ballet of knobs, buttons, sliders, and dials, but the microphone still intimidated me. One day, just before the show was to air, John got up to go to the bathroom and he didn't come back until the end of our time slot. Trial by fire. I had gotten through the program solo but shaken.

From then on, I did every other week for a few years until John decided to retire and leave the show in my hands. The other person that was integral in my 'career' as a broadcaster and event MC gigs, was Greg Simpson. I had listened to Greg on local radio, as a teen and years later, buying vinyl from him when he was the manager of a record store. Greg was one of the few guys that could beat me at music trivia. Not just beat me, but really humble me.

Greg and I sat on the board of The Great Lakes Blues Society, together, in the early days of the society, and when the opportunities to broadcast and do some MC work arose, he was very encouraging and always willing to share his expertise with me. Greg didn't suffer fools easily. He could be acerbic when speaking with anyone and always spoke his mind, but we got along very well. I learned a lot always felt Greg had my back.

I've been doing 'The Blues Never Die' radio show for about 12 years now and have been doing MC work for about 10, and still often go back to the lessons that both these men have taught me. The program is presented on a campus/community radio platform through the University of Western Ontario.

Over the years, I have had a couple opportunities to expand my show or 'A' show to a larger audience with a different platform but have declined. I like the fact that I play what I want and am not obliged to follow somebody else's' playlist. The program has been lucky enough to be nominated for a Forest City Music Award (now defunct) for several consecutive years. My personal leanings are towards a rock-blues but love and do play all sub-genres of blues. The programs' mandate is to always promote local artists, new releases and whoever may be playing locally. Between the 'Blues Never Die' FB page and 'The Blues News', on the program,

I like to keep a fairly concise list of who's playing where in the 519 area code and promote those shows on each program. Now, as chairman of the 'Great Lakes Blues Society', I have the opportunity of helping decide which bands we get to bring to London. "What a long, strange trip it's been".
