

## Willy A's Views and Music Reviews

#### Eric Bibb - Ridin' (Stony Plain Records)



For those of you who are unfamiliar with Eric Bibb, he is a long standing Roots music tunesmith, (Blues music being a large part of that umbrella), who has for the past 50 years, dedicated himself and his music to the freedom and equality of mankind worldwide. To some, this goal might be written off as simply pie in the sky and unrealistic but for Eric Bibb it's been his driving force; his lifelong passion. From an early age his inspiration was drawn from both the 50's and 60's Roots music scene of Greenwich Village and from his civil rights activist father, **Leon Bibb**. The elder Bibb was a

renowned actor and Folk singer, who marched alongside **Dr. Martin Luther King** during the Civil Rights movement in 1950's and 60's. As such, the music of Odetta, Dylan, Baez and others, charted the younger Bibb's path, in advocating for freedom and respect for all. To date, Bibb has recorded 24 solo studio albums, 18 collaborative albums with various world artists and 4 Live albums, showcasing a vast array of his songs, written to entertain, educate, inspire and motivate the listener all at the same time. But I'm wondering if the two collaborative albums with his father, in 2002 and 2006, were possibly his most satisfying, with a proud father knowing that the Civil Rights torch has been passed on to very capable hands.

His new record is, **Ridin'**, and given the numerous incidents of questionable law enforcement actions over the past number of years, Bibb could have chosen a harsh, negative approach to racial equality in his album playlist. But instead, his songs balance the negativity of the past with a request to use common sense and compassion moving forward and to learn from our mistakes. It's all here in his deep spirituality and his unwavering faith in mankind.

The opening track is "Family" and it's a subtle reminder that we are all family of the human race and we need to set aside our physical and perceived cultural differences and really get to know and learn from each other. The song constantly drives home this message, using African percussive beats throughout and punctuated by some short but effective and strategically placed guitar and organ fills. The choral refrain of the song's title, definitely brings the message home.

Next up is the title track, "Ridin", which offers us a ticket to board the Freedom Train; to learn from our past and move ahead. This songs theme reminded me of the O'Jays 1970's RnB classic, Love Train. Bibb's train is of course, a metaphor for racial understanding and acceptance. It can't be derailed and it only moves forward. Once again, the train is driven by drums that simulate the constant clacking over the rails and some scorching guitar that

keeps this engine pushing forward. This Freedom Train is truly unstoppable.

"Blues Funky Like Dat" is a banjo enhanced Americana romp that serves to point out that people aren't perfect; even men of the cloth can have their distractions. The subject is a preacher who faithfully serves his parishioners but needs a Blues diversion of the devils music every Friday night at the local juke joint. Taj Mahal comes on board to provide some funked up howls and growls that help this one come alive.

Bibb then channels his reflective side of the injustice theme in "The Ballad of John Howard", which ironically brings to light racial prejudice experienced by a white man in the late 1950's. Howard was disgusted with the treatment of African Americans in the south and coloured his skin through the use of pills/chemicals and a sunlamp, to experience that degradation. The 1961 Book (and later movie) "Black Like Me", chronicled his experiences. Bibbs tribute to his courage is accompanied by a simple strumming guitar. It's Bibb, the story teller, at his finest.

country song, "500 Miles", is simply a beautiful heart felt cover of Bobby Bare's 1963 classic. When I first heard the original as a teen, it brought tears to my eyes and Bibb brought that memory right back to me. Obviously, this song was one of his favourites, which he felt he just had to record. Although it's not really tied to the albums theme, it's a touching piece of Roots music that doesn't feel out of place.

The next track, "Tulsa Town", screams of racial tension. Its frame of reference is the 1921 destruction and slaughter of a thriving African American community in Tulsa, Oklahoma, leaving over 800 dead or injured and 35 square blocks of neighbourhood destroyed. Bibb states the facts. The white supremacist attack was tragic, unprovoked and was ignored in history books. The song may be up tempo, but the subject is haunting; once again with a spiritual choral backing, adding horror to this unfathomable tragedy.

Demanding respect is well covered here as well. "I Got My Own" points out that folks don't always need help from others when they have their own ways and means of achieving their goals. Just allow them to show what they're capable of. Having your own keys to a vehicle of choice is simply a metaphor for getting to where you need to go. Next up, "Call Me by My Name" insists that African Americans have earned legitimate respect for having literally slaved and built so much of America. As Bibb states emphatically, "I'm not your boy", so call me by my name.

There's a subtle religious undertone to many of the songs I've mentioned so far. But Bibbs feels that a deep connection to a supreme being and the hereafter plays a major role in any just society. The inevitable death of us all and the seeds we sew while living, are reflected in the song, "Sinner Man". It was recorded live at the Wheatland Festival and emphatically points out that you can't hide from your sins on Judgement Day. Sinners will ultimately face their

fiery downward slide. "Free" also reminds us to be true to who we are, as it will ultimately free your soul on the day of reckoning. The track "People You Love" uses the theme of death as well but in a very positive way. With death comes hurt and sorrow, but he points out the beauty of how friends and family gather around us in our time of need, to ease our burden and to help us get through. We often take this support for granted but Bibb feels it is well worth reminding us of its importance.

As you can see, Eric Bibb has asked us to examine who we are from many different angles. Although not blessed with a powerful voice, when he sings his beautifully crafted lyrics, it's as if he's conversing directly across the kitchen table. He commands our attention. The guests on this album are far too many to list. Also, there doesn't appear to be a resource for crediting their musical contributions; just their names. But it's of note that our own **Harrison Kennedy** is one that's mentioned. Call this album Blues, Roots or Americana, but if you're looking for songs of substance and relevance, written with artistic determination and focus, this is perfectly crafted for you. We wish Eric Bibb the best on his continuing journey, in search of freedom and equality for all.
